Juniores can make a difference for endangered species globally by donating to the World Wildlife Fund (WWF) or the International Fund for Animal Welfare (IFAW). Both are dedicated to protecting and saving endangered species, such as the Red Cockaded Woodpecker. Red Cockaded Woodpeckers are endangered throughout the world because human deforestation and construction destroy their natural habitat. Opportunities to make a difference in Florida include visiting or volunteering at bird refuge centers which helps the process of releasing animals into the wild. A few of these centers in Florida are the White Oak Conservation Center in Yulee, B.E.A.K.S. in Jacksonville, Wildlife Center of Venice, and Pelican Island National Wildlife Refuge in Wassabo Beach. Finally, Juniores can even have a fundraising day to raise money or a supplies drive to collect materials for a local sanctuary near their club.
