Reporting Tips



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Don't let "Reporting" intimidate you. Get creative, think out of the box!

2 important items to include in your reporting is Leadership INSIDE my club and Leadership IN MY COMMUNITY. We want to hear something unusual, exciting, different, cute...

- How do you recognize your members who do a good job? **Maybe a monthly MVP award.**
- Do you need to engage your board? On the average there are 10 meetings a year (excluding Christmas, July and maybe August).

- At your annual meeting, recognize your members, chairmen and those who are always ready to accomplish something...not merely to exist.
- When was the last time you looked at your by-laws? Get the club involved, engage your parliamentarian.

- Skits are a lost art form, bring them back to help your club address its problems.
- Does your club know what the chairmen do?
- In the community, Pick an organization, could be health, fire/police, school, teachers - Recognize them. Make a plaque, have a presentation. Pick someone from several organizations and come up with a catchy theme regarding their leadership in the community

- **What about a club website, they are so easy to do.** Your younger members need to be engaged, and boy - are they clever in this department!
- How about a presentation from your Parliamentarian?
- Biggest failure in reporting: Narrative and no stat sheet.
